# Prayer & One Another James 5:13-18

Welcome: [Pastor Bernie]

- Today we come to James 5:13-18 and instruction on prayer. We will be exhorted to depend upon God and to involve the church in our prayers.
  - ▶ James 5:13-18 <sup>13</sup> Is anyone among you suffering? Let him pray. Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing praise. <sup>14</sup> Is anyone among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord. <sup>15</sup> And the prayer of faith will save the one who is sick, and the Lord will raise him up. And if he has committed sins, he will be forgiven. <sup>16</sup> Therefore, confess your sins to one another and pray for one another, that you may be healed. The prayer of a righteous person has great power as it is working. <sup>[b]</sup> <sup>17</sup> Elijah was a man with a nature like ours, and he prayed fervently that it might not rain, and for three years and six months it did not rain on the earth. <sup>18</sup> Then he prayed again, and heaven gave rain, and the earth bore its fruit.

#### PRAYER: UPWARD DEPENDENCE

**Meditation on Prayer – "Why Share Your Despair with Others?" -** Day #27 from *Gospel Meditations on Prayer* – by Joe Tyrpak [Pastor Steve]

<sup>8</sup> For we do not want you to be unaware, brothers, <sup>[b]</sup> of the affliction we experienced in Asia. For we were so utterly burdened beyond our strength that we despaired of life itself. <sup>9</sup> Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death. But that was to make us rely not on ourselves but on God who raises the dead. <sup>10</sup> He delivered us from such a deadly peril, and he will deliver us. On him we have set our hope that he will deliver us again. <sup>11</sup> You also must help us by prayer, so that many will give thanks on our behalf for the blessing granted us through the prayers of many - II Corinthians 1:11

Living for Christ is full of immense burdens, some of which are so heavy and constant that you, like Paul, could "despair of life" (v.8). No one is totally certain of all that Paul meant by "the afflictions we experienced in Asia" He certainly had in mind the constant plotting of Jews to take his life, as well as the united animosity of the silversmiths in Ephesus--which is where Paul was

working when he wrote II Corinthians. The opposition in Ephesus had broken out in a riot that nearly killed a few of Paul's teammates. (You can read all about these problems in Acts 19-20). Paul's afflictions also included the weight of the situation 400 miles away in Corinth. One of his most strategic church plants was apparently redefining the gospel and rejecting Paul's leadership. All of these trials combined to make Paul's years of church planting efforts in Ephesus some of the worst (yet, by God's grace, some of the best) in his life. In his season of despair, Paul learned four helpful realities about hardships.

Sometimes your hardships feel unbearably heavy. It's immensely encouraging to know that someone as godly and spiritual as Paul could feel "so utterly burdened beyond [his] strength that [he] despaired of life itself" (v. 8). Can you believe that? Less than a year earlier this same man had written to the same church that God "will not let you be tempted beyond your ability" (I Corinthians 10:13). Now, Paul teaches that, although trials are never too heavy for us, they sometimes feel as though they are heavier than we can handle. Burdened believer, take heart. Paul, who had written I Corinthians 10:13, sometimes felt like II Corinthians 1:8. Remain firmly convinced that God is in fact limiting your trials, even though you often feel like they're going to crush you.

Your hardships should bring you to the end of yourself. Paul's afflictions made him feel certain that he was going to die; he lost all hope of life. But this wretched feeling of despair produced wonderful results: It led him to stop relying on himself (v. 9). Apparently, even the apostle Paul had seasons of ease when his daily focus quietly shifted from God to himself. Trials have a way of revealing sinful self-reliance. What grace!

**Your hardships force you to rely on God.** In his season of despair, Paul learned to hope in "God who raises the dead" (v. 9). Paul knew that God had raised Jesus from the dead, and God would one day raise all Christians from the dead. Notice how Paul was exemplary in applying the theology he knew. As Paul Barnett puts it, "it is... very easy to regard this God [who raises the dead] as remote and distant from the present situation, to think of him as the God of theology and not of reality" [*The Message of II Cor. p. 34*]. You must know what God has done in the past, know what He's promised to do in the future, and then take the time to apply it to your despair today. Past resurrection + future resurrection = present hope. You must be able to say courageously with Paul in the face of disheartening circumstances, "God has delivered us, and He will deliver us again" (v. 10; I Samuel 17:37).

Your hardships make you depend on the prayers of others. Paul's despair led him to value the intercession of other believers (v. 11). You too must rely on the prayers of Christian friends because God has chosen to multiply His glory and His people's joy in this way. The goal of prayer is not simply "problem solved," but the greater glory of God and the greater joy of His people. Take time right now to pray for the needs of another believer, and then ask another believer to pray for one of your burdens."

"Lord, forgive me for pride that often keeps me from sharing my problems with others. I don't like to admit my weaknesses to others, and I rely way too much on my own strength. Help me rely on You and on the prayers of Your people-not only so that I'll be helped, but so that You'll be glorified and Your people encouraged. In Jesus' name. Amen."
