THE CRUCIFIXION OF JESUS

This morning as we both celebrate and contemplate the resurrection of Jesus, we must begin with thinking about the glory of his death. Resurrection cannot happen unless there is death. But why would we rejoice in and be thankful for death? How could a cross, an abhorrent Roman method of public and shameful execution be something wonderful? This glorious paradox, God takes that which is shameful and makes it glorious. He turns defeat into victory. He took that which was meant by the world to be shameful and made it something that is magnificent. Jesus demonstrates through his life that real exaltation comes as the result of humility. Let's remember what Paul writes in Philippians 2 as he puts this concept on full display:

Philippians 2: 5-11

⁵ Have this mind among yourselves, which is yours in Christ Jesus, ⁶ who, though he was in the form of God, did not count equality with God a thing to be grasped, ⁷ but emptied himself, by taking the form of a servant, being born in the likeness of men. ⁸ And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. ⁹ Therefore God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, ¹⁰ so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, ¹¹ and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Let us linger at Calvary, and over the precious blood he spilled for us. May we do so with eyes opened and illumined by his Spirit as we see beyond the horror of this gruesome execution to the glory of what he obtained for us.

²¹ And they compelled a passerby, Simon of Cyrene, who was coming in from the country, the father of Alexander and Rufus, to carry his cross. ²² And they brought him to the place called Golgotha (which means Place of a Skull). ²³ And they offered him wine mixed with myrrh, but he did not take it. ²⁴ And they crucified him and divided his garments among them, casting lots for them, to decide what each should take. ²⁵ And it was the third hour when they crucified him. ²⁶ And the inscription of the charge against him read, "The King of the Jews." ²⁷ And with him they crucified two robbers, one on his right and one on his left. ²⁹ And those who passed by derided him, wagging their heads and saying, "Aha! when the centurion, who stood facing him, saw that in this way he breathed his last, he said, "Truly this man was the Son of God!"

⁴⁰ There were also women looking on from a distance, among whom were Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James the younger and of Joses, and Salome. ⁴¹ When he was in Galilee, they followed him and ministered to him, and there were also many other women who came up with him to Jerusalem.

Have you ever been at the cross? Not literally, but emotionally and empathetically? Have you stood there and watched, seen and been gripped by the wonder of the crucifixion? When we consider that Jesus gave his life for you, it should cause you to tremble with a holy awe and it should instill faith and worship in your heart.

THE EXALTATION & REIGN OF JESUS

The resurrection is glorious not only because it marked the defeat of sin and death, but because it also inaugurated the ascension and reign of Jesus Christ, where he is now exalted, sitting at the right hand of God. In Acts 1:8-11, we have the account of Jesus leaving this earth and ascending into heaven.

⁸ But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth." ⁹ And when he had said these things, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him out of their sight. ¹⁰ And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, ¹¹ and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

¹What does it mean when we say that Jesus is "exalted" at God's right hand? Perhaps you've thought of this in terms of our exalting him. We exalt him in our praises. We exalt Jesus when we declare his worth and speak of his greatness, and sing words of praise. Truly, a central aspect of what it means to be a Christian is that Christ is our Lord, and we exalt him in our worship and with our lives.

But when we say that Jesus is "exalted," the first and most important truth to draw attention to isn't that *we* exalt him but that *God* exalts him: welcoming him to sit, as king, on the very throne of heaven. As Philippians 2:9 says, "God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name." First God exalts him – and then we follow suit.

God has now crowned him King of all kings, at the very apex of the universe, not just as God but as man. The man Christ Jesus sits in the very seat of God, and "He must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet" (I Corinthians 15:25). This is what it means, first and foremost, that "he is exalted." He rose from the dead. He ascended to heaven. And the Father has highly exalted his Son to the very highest of places. The Ancient of Days has acknowledged the fullness and completeness of the work of His Son, the God-man, and has raised him to the throne at his right hand.
